The Guyan Conservation District now has a Grass works Weed Wiper available for rent through the office. The Weed Wiper is designed to be aggressive, yet economical and environmentallyfriendly in the method of applying herbicides to control weeds in hay and pasture fields. The rotating drum ensures maximum chemical

transfer to the weeds, yet eliminates drips to the desired crop. The Weed Wiper operates at speeds up to 15 mph and has adjustable height that allows for application on the targeted weeds only. The machinery is 10 feet wide.

- A current soil test that is less than 3 years of the date the practice is required.

#### **Cost Share Rate:**

- \$20 per acre

#### **Pollinator Habitat Program**

Provides food and habitat for pollinators to help them thrive. In farming situations this increases production per acre. In

the wild, biodiversity increases and wildlife food vesting system. sources increase.

#### Limits:

- 1 acre minimum
- Soil pH 5.8 or greater
- A current soil test that is less than 3 years of the date the practice is requested.

#### **Cost Share Rate:**

\$445 flat rate

#### Nutrient Management

To improve soil structure, better soil tilth, reduce erosion and increase the production of grassland.

#### Limits:

- 50 acre maximum
- Pasture or meadow only.
- 6.0 pH or greater
- A current soil test that is less than 1 year of the date the practice is requested.

#### **Cost Share Rate:**

- 75% the cost of the product
- \$100/per acre
- Not to exceed \$5,000

#### **Roof Runoff Program:**

To manage water quality by directing water that falls on roofed areas to be directed to a stable outfall avoiding contamination by fecal material and/or sediment improving soil and water quality.



#### Limits:

Not to exceed \$2,000

#### **Cost Share Rate:**

75% cost share on materials and labor

#### **Urban Agriculture**

Assists with the purchase of a commercially produced raised bed, composting structure and or a rain water har-



#### Limits:

Not to exceed \$300

#### **Cost Share Rate:**

75% of receipts

#### **Guyan CD Guidelines for Participation:**

- Land must be engaged in the production of agricultural products.
  - All AgEP practices are limited by available funds.
  - Sign up periods for applications will go from September 1 - December 31, 2015.
  - All practices must be completed by the deadline of May 31, 2016.
- Soil tests are encouraged on all practices. WVU lab preferred

NRCS offers a variety of cost-share assistance programs for landowners to enhance their property and protect natural resources. All programs operate on a continuous sign-up. Here are a few general details on what may be available:

Livestock Operators: Establishing watering systems, establishing rotational grazing systems and associated fences, increasing the efficiency of on farm nutrient management, increasing the quality and quantity of forage plants, and solving erosion and runoff issues associated with winter feeding areas

Truck Crop Operators: Seasonal tunnels, nutrient management planning, and cover crops

Forest Management Plans: Include thinning, invasive species control, or cull tree removal.

Woodland Operators: Reclaiming logging roads into wildlife feeding areas, planting wildlife friendly trees, shrubs and other plants and implementation of wildlife friendly planting.

We also have a program that may provide cost assistance to maintain conservation already in place for those landowners who are meeting all of their conservation needs. And of course, NRCS is always available for general conservation assistance with no program obligation for all the above listed activities.

Application cut-off date for FY2016 is October 15, 2015. Applications made after this

date will be held until addition funding is received or until FY2017 signup.
