



## FYAGRICULTURAL ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM ANNUAL REPORT

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#### Eastern Panhandle Conservation District **AgEP Success in Jefferson County**

In Jefferson County, farmland is being parceled out into smaller lots. In many of these smaller acre properties, agricultural values are a lost concept. However, a new Jefferson County landowner decided to install small-scale Best Management Practices (BMPs) on their 11-acre "homestead."

With the landowner's goals including sustainable production for their family and pollinators, they enrolled in the Eastern Panhandle Conservation District's Honeybee Nucleus Colony and Urban & Community Agriculture programs.

Within the first year of property ownership, the landowner has installed four cold frames, two raised beds, trellising systems, and one honeybee nucleus colony. The landowner is looking forward to participating in FY25 programs to implement a pollinator habitat plot as well as cover crops.

Development and expansion of urbanization can be a threat to agriculture, yet small-scale agriculture BMP programs prove to be effective at keeping ag land in ag use.








#### Guyan Conservation District Field Days Submitted by Caitlin Black







provided by cooperators.









AgEP staff assisted cooperators with the installation of 768 Best Management Practices (BMPs) in Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24). The completion rate was 72.15% across West Virginia's fourteen conservation districts.

FY24 applications totaled 1,181 with 158 of those being unfunded. In some districts, cost-share assistance is in great demand and the ranking process can be very competitive. Application acceptance is based on ranking score and availability of funds. Another benefit to the locally led program is that board supervisors may also seek outside funding sources such as grants to supplement the AgEP program in their districts.
